Sierra Club calls out to its members to help Long Island's waters: This is our most aggressive, hands on campaign yet and we need your help! Sierra Club, the South Shore Estuary Reserve Council and the New York State Marine Education Association are partnering to test the south shore bays and their tributaries and gather data on an ongoing and consistent basis. Speaker Lou Siegel has created the sSELF Program, which enlists the help of students and community groups to monitor various physical and chemical parameters in the waters of the Reserve. Lou will describe the program and demonstrate the equipment used by each group. We invite you to participate in this very important campaign. Our waters are polluted. We need baseline data. We need you to adopt a student, test kit and waterway- you will be able to track your waterway and your data. Come see how you can be an ongoing part of this important baseline data collection.

The Town of Riverhead is proceeding with plans to develop the 3000 - acre former Grumman property in Calverton, now known as Enterprise Park at Calverton (EPCAL). We believe it is critical that the Town and private developers at EPCAL acknowledge and avoid impacts to the considerable natural resources at the site. EPCAL is entirely within a Deep Groundwater Recharge Area, which contribute recharge water to a deep groundwater flow system, thus replenishing the quantity and affecting the quality of the long-term water supply. The EPCAL site also provides habitat for several endangered and threatened species in NYS, including the Eastern Tiger Salamander, Marbled Salamander, Eastern Spadefoot, Spotted Turtle, Eastern Box Turtle, and Eastern Hognose snake. The on-site grasslands are the largest such habitat remaining on Long Island, and provide documented breeding and foraging habitat for numerous grassland birds, including the endangered short-eared owl, the threatened Northern Harrier, and five Species of Special Concern (Common Nighthawk, Grasshopper Sparrow, Vesper Sparrow, Horned Lark, and Whip-poor-will). These grasslands are, in fact, the most productive breeding grounds for Grasshopper Sparrow (a Species of Special Concern) in all of New York State.

Directions: From Sunrise Highway (Rte.27) take exit 64 S, and head south on Route 104. Go 2 miles and turn right onto Old Country Road. Go 0.7 miles, entrance is on the right when the road bends left.

## UPDATE ON RENEWABLE SCHOOLS INITIATIVE

Day after day, Styrofoam lunch trays and plastic bottles are thrown into school garbage cans along with food scraps, aluminum, and paper and taken to landfills and incinerators across the country. Through the hard work of students, teachers, and administrators willing to cut through red tape, some schools are joining the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Here are two very different stories of recycling in schools, featuring several environmental heroes. ### **Albert G. Prodel Middle School Begins "Green Project"**

The Albert G. Prodel Middle School in Shoreham, NY has begun a move to make their school greener! The "Green Project", which began its Phase 1 on October 27<sup>th</sup>, focuses on creating a realistic, school-wide recycling program. Four brave 7<sup>th</sup> grade students, Shannon, Rachel, Francesca, and Oliva, under the guidance of science teacher Kevin Willi and the school's principal, Ms. Anthony, kicked off the initiative with an assembly about the program. These students created and delivered a power point presentation and speech about the importance of recycling. Afterward, they also participated in a question and answer session... all in front of the entire student body of 600+ students!!!



The school's Phase 1 of its "Green Project" asks students to place aluminum cans, plastic and glass bottles (without the caps) in clearly marked blue recycle bins strategically placed throughout the school. However, the bottle caps, which are created from a different type of plastic, cannot be easily recycled. Students at the assembly were asked to brainstorm solutions so that the bottle caps would not become landfill trash. Several ideas that were generated included using them for art projects, craft sales, and collecting them for charity. An 8<sup>th</sup> grade science teacher, Anthony Rohm, has already asked his students create hovercrafts to teach the principles of fluid friction from a bottle cap, a used compact disk and a balloon!!!

As with most school recycling programs, organization and implementation of the plan was a complicated task. Without the participation of teaching and custodial staff, administration, the school's carting company and, most importantly the students, the "Green Project" could not happen. Upcoming phases of the plan include the school's Pride Club collecting and positively using the bottle caps, organizing collection of cardboard pizza boxes, a spring-time paper drive and restoration of the school's greenhouse.



### **Bold Effort in North Babylon**

Kaelyn McParland wants to see her high school implement a recycling program before she graduates. An experienced volunteer at North Babylon High School, she thought it would be easy. When she reached out to the Town of Babylon's Vicky Russell and Ron Kluessner, they offered to provide combined municipal carting and recycling –but the school would need to end their current carting contract.

Kaelyn created and twice gave a power point presentation to her school district about the waste generated by the school and the town's solution. The first presentation was in early summer of '08 to the district's administrative staff. The new superintendent, Dr. A'loise, and Buildings and Grounds Administrator Phil Bock were



supportive, and Dr. A'loise asked her to present the material to the school board in September. Over the summer, the Town of Babylon formalized their offer to all town school districts – the town would provide the blue recycling bins and dumpsters needed, and take away the waste and recycling for processing. Furthermore, Babylon would do this at half the cost of standard hauling rates—a big bonus for taxpayers. Kaelyn gave her second presentation this past September to the North Babylon school board, showing them an easy, healthier, and less expensive way to deal with garbage and reduce waste. With all the groundwork done, it seemed that recycling could begin any day, but since September, Kaelyn's dream remains just that. Other schools in Babylon are reaping the benefits of her vision- the Deer Park school district immediately saw the advantages of the town's recycling offer, and they are implementing recycling at this time. Kaelyn is still waiting to hear from her own school, and she graduates in June.

### **CLEAN COAL - WHAT'S THAT?**

You must have heard the latest buzz phrase: "clean coal"! This is the classic oxymoron. Many who advocate the so-called "energy independence" like to promote clean coal as the ultimate independent energy source. Coal is abundant, cheap, and mined in the continental US. View the film "Burning the Future: Coal in America" and you certainly would never associate clean and coal again. This documentary goes behind the 51% of electricity generated in the USA from coal and shows the destruction and devastation from mountain top removal coal mining to the environment, and people's lives and livelihoods in the Appalachians where a significant part of American coal output is derived. The documentary is very graphic and moving in its illustration of the damage to water systems and to people's health from mountain top removal coal mining. I highly recommend this documentary for social studies and environmental science teachers, as well as anyone interested in learning more about coal and energy production in the US. # THE TRUTH ABOUT LIQUIFIED NATURAL GAS

Broadwater, the liquefied natural gas barge proposed for Long Island Sound was defeated in April of this year, but there are 3 more proposed projects slated off our local shores.

One such project called "Safe Harbor Energy" would be 13 miles off the coast of Long Beach, NY and 19 miles off Sea Bright, NJ. This would be a 62.5 acre man-made island.

The second, "Blue Ocean Energy," would be a floating LNG 30 miles off of Long Island, 20 miles east of New Jersey.

The third, "Liberty Natural Gas Project," would be a deep-water pipeline system 15 miles off Asbury Park, New Jersey.

Long Island Sierra Club as well as the Sierra Atlantic Chapter do not support these projects. They are just more fossil fuel infrastructure. We support conservation and renewable energy.

As recently as September 2008, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) approved a new LNG import terminal and related send out pipeline for the Pacific Northeast. This facility will be constructed on the Columbia River in Oregon. The FERC contends that after careful review all safety precautions will be in place and that the project will supplement energy needs for that region. These facilities are not safe, nor do they give us independence from foreign fossil fuels.

Here are some additional facts that should be noted attesting to why we should be opposing these infrastructures. These facts were taken from the documentary "The Risks and Danger of LNG" by Tim & Hagden Riley 2004, [www.LngDanger.com](http://www.LngDanger.com). The residents of a couple of towns in California are also fighting these LNG facilities that prompted this documentary.

In January 2004 LNG exploded in Algeria. There have been other explosions throughout the world. It takes 5 miles to halt a LNG tanker. The tanker is longer than 3 football fields and is 12 stories high. The explosive strength is equivalent to 55 Hiroshima bombs. They are using the same type of vessel that they have used for the past 40 years. It is a double hull ship like that of the USS Cole that was breached by terrorists in Sept. 2000.

An average tanker holds 33 million gallons of liquefied gas. With a 35 second leak 2,500 gallons would be released. The gas is chilled to minus 260 degrees; should a leak occur, it warms immediately, hitting the air, making it explosive.

As for its contribution to global warming, it is a methane gas, which is about 21 times more powerful at warming the atmosphere than CO2. The Patriot Act is restricting 90,000 documents on the safety of LNGs. These are just a few examples why we should all make our voices heard and oppose all LNGs.



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It's time for America to get smart about energy and be less dependent on dwindling oil reserves. We need to increase our use of clean, renewable energy sources like wind and solar power. Let your voice be heard.
